

This second webinar in our Parkinson's disease (PD) series focuses on the important role of multidisciplinary healthcare in supporting people living with PD.


The primary care team—including GPs, nurses, allied health providers, and pharmacists—plays a key role in ensuring individuals with PD are referred to the right team members throughout the course of the disease.

Following diagnosis (covered in our <u>first webinar</u>), people with PD need ongoing support to understand PD and adapt as their disease progresses over time. This session will explore the roles of commonly involved team members, such as PD nurses, physiotherapists, occupational therapists, and speech pathologists, who will speak to their contributions at various stages of the disease.

This session will also discuss access to both public and private services available to support this care.

The session will conclude with an introduction to an exciting research initiative led by Professor Michele Callisaya, which aims to expand access to allied health services for all Tasmanians through innovative telehealth models.

Monoclonal Gammopathy of Uncertain Significance (MGUS) is an increasingly recognised incidental finding in general practice, particularly in the context of routine blood tests in older patients. While MGUS itself is often asymptomatic, it carries a risk of progression to more serious plasma cell disorders, including multiple myeloma. GPs play a critical role in the early identification, risk assessment, monitoring, and timely referral of patients with MGUS. This session will present the updated statewide guidance on the investigation and monitoring of paraproteins and MGUS, with a focus on when specialist referral is required. The webinar aims to equip GPs with practical, evidence-based knowledge to support confident decision-making in the assessment and management of these patients in primary care.
